When we understand this we will have the proper perspective to find the church that God wants us to be planted in.



# **Motivation for seeking a new Church**

This is an area that many Christians get wrong. May Christians leave a church because they are offended or don't like the pastor. Here are some questions to consider before moving forward.

Am I offended by something in the church or a person in the church? Stay and resolve the issue. If you don't work this out you will not have God's blessing to move on. Your issues with the current church will only follow you to the next church.

Are you leaving because you don't like the pastor? If the pastor is correctly teaching the Word of God and fulfills the biblical mandate of 1 Timothy 3 and Titus 1 for a leader then you should stay. Pray for the pastor and be involved in the ministry of the church. Your issues with the pastor will only follow you to the next church.

Is the church/pastor correctly teaching the Word of God? If the answer is no, first bring the concerns about wrong teaching with gentleness. If after three attempts to correct the wrong teaching then begin to seek a new church.

Is God telling you to move to a new church? Begin by praying and asking God to clearly speak to you if you are to move to a new church. Be sure to clearly hear from God before moving on. If God is not giving clear direction to move then stay where you are. It is extremely rare that God calls a person to move from one church to another. If it is clear that God is leading you to move churches then follow the remainder of this guide.



# Before You Begin To Look For A Church

# 1. Pray and Seek the Holy Spirit's Direction

Before embarking on the journey of finding a new church you must start with two things. It's essential to start with prayer and seeking guidance from the Holy Spirit. Dedicate some quiet moments to commune with God. Pour out your heart and express your desires, concerns, and hopes for finding a new church home. Ask for wisdom and discernment in the decision-making process.

**Start with Prayer**: While praying take the time to listen. Be attentive to any promptings or impressions you may sense from the Holy Spirit. Sometimes, guidance comes in subtle ways, so be open and receptive.

Seek Confirmation: As you pray, seek confirmation through various means. This could include reading relevant scriptures. Seek counsel from trusted mentors or friends. Notice recurring themes or messages that God is speaking to you.

God's Timing: Remember that God's timing is perfect. Even if the process of finding a new church takes longer than expected trust that God is working. He may be orchestrating events behind the scenes for your good.

Prayer and seeking the Holy Spirit's direction lay a firm foundation for the journey ahead. This will guide your steps as you explore potential new church communities.

#### 2. List Priorities

Before visiting potential new churches, take some time to reflect on your priorities. Here's a helpful framework for identifying what matters most to you:

**Teaching & Theology**: Consider your theological convictions. How do they align with the teachings of the church? Do you have specific doctrinal requirements or preferences?

Community: Contemplate what is needed within the church community to build relationships. The kind of relationship that will grow in depth and help in mutual growth in faith.

Ministry: Evaluate how you can serve and be involved in ministry. What opportunities for serving others are important to you? Does the church offer avenues for you to use your spiritual gifts and talents?

Leadership: Investigate the leadership style of the church. Does the church have a council of elders who fit the model of 1 Timothy 3 and Titus 1? Are the elders the spiritual leaders of the church? Are they seeking God's direction for the church? Do they oversee the church according to scripture? How do the elders hand conflict and sin in the church?

Current Issues: We live in an age where not every church has a biblical stance on key modern/social issues of the day. It is important to find out what the church believes about these issues. Do they hold to what scripture says about such subjects? Can they defend their position by properly using the Bible?

**Location**: Consider practical factors such as the church's location. Is it in reasonable proximity to your home? As you witness to your friends and neighbors is the church close enough to invite others to come?

By listing your priorities, you'll have a clearer understanding of what you're looking for in a new church. It will make it easier to evaluate potential options when you begin visiting different congregations.

#### 3. List Preferences

It is helpful to list your preferences when searching for a new church.

Worship Style: Reflect on your preferred worship style. Are you drawn to traditional hymns, contemporary praise and worship, or a blend of both? As you consider worship style understand that singing praises to God is about focusing on God. This should transcend worship styles. It doesn't mean you cannot have your preference, just be aware that the music is about God and not you.

ministry. Do not shy away from churches that don't have children's or youth programming. The question to ask is how are the children/youth incorporated and a part of the church?

Church Size: Like programs, the size of the church should not be a priority. The size of the church is irrelevant to where God wants you to worship and serve. What one should consider is evangelism. Is the church evangelizing the community? Do they have a plan to plant more churches once they get to a predefined size?

Listing your preferences alongside your priorities. This will help you narrow down your search for where God wants to plant you.

#### 4. Website/Livestream/Social Media

Take advantage of the digital resources available. Learn more about the community and its offerings. This will be helpful before you physically visiting a church.

Church Website: Start by visiting the church's official website. Look for sections that provide information about their beliefs, mission, and values. Explore details about their services, ministries, and upcoming

events. Use the website to see the church's statement of faith. If the church doesn't post this on their website you should attain a copy of it from the church leadership. This statement of faith should state what they believe about who God is, the authority of the Holy Bible, and the gospel. The website should also include the vision and direction of the church. The vision should include how the church evangelizes, disciples, fellowships, prays and worships. The website may also indicate what denomination, if any, the church is affiliated with. The denomination the church is affiliated with may give a greater understanding of what the church believes and how it does ministry.

Livestream Services: Many churches offer livestream services. Take the opportunity to tune in to a livestream service to get a feel for the worship style and preaching. Pay attention to the accuracy and clarity of the sermon. Are the sermons Biblically sound?

Social Media Pages: Check out the church's social media pages on platforms (Facebook, Instagram, Threads, Youtube or X). Social media can provide a glimpse into the church's ongoing activities and community engagement. Look for posts about recent events, testimonials from members, and opportunities to get involved. Engage with the content by liking, commenting, or asking questions to get a sense of the church's

online presence and responsiveness.

Visiting the church's website, livestream, and social media pages allows you to gather valuable information and insights before attending in person. It can help you determine if the church aligns with Biblical priorities, making your physical visit more focused and informed.
